LEGISLATIVE LETTER

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JULY 28, 1978

"VOTING RECORDS" ARE THE "KEY"

The voting records contained herein show how the members of the Florida Legislature voted on major issues of interest to the general business community in Florida during the 1977 and 1978 regular and special sessions of the Legislature. These certainly are not the only major issues of interest to the business community, but they are the ones where it is felt a definite philosophical vote was necessary. As will be noted, there are votes listed on motions, amendments, and in committees in addition to votes on final passage of bills. In many cases, the votes on motions, amendments, and in committee are much more significant than votes on final passage but are seldom reported to the business community and the public. This report attempts to fill that void.

No one vote should sway your opinion of your legislators. However, after reviewing this booklet, it is hoped you will draw your own conclusions as to whether or not your legislators' "votes" on major business issues have been in the best interest of your business and the entire business community.

PICK YOUR CANDIDATES AND "GET INVOLVED"

It matters little what a legislator says during a campaign for office unless his "voting record" speaks the same language. Your company, its employees, and the stockholders have a big stake in the legislative process. The "votes" of your legislators should be a major criteria on which you base your "support" or "opposition" at election time.

Your Association cannot tell you which legislators you should "support" or which you should "oppose" -- BUT, WE FEEL COMPELLED IN THE BEST INTEREST OF YOUR COMPANY TO URGE YOU TO BECOME INVOLVED IN THE ELECTIVE PROCESS BY SUPPORTING THOSE CANDIDATES WHO, BY THEIR VOTING RECORDS, HAVE SHOWN THAT THEY SUPPORT THE FREE ENTERPRISE SYSTEM. IF YOU FAIL TO STAND UP FOR YOUR COMPANY'S INTEREST AT ELECTION TIME, THEN HALF OF THE BATTLE HAS BEEN LOST BEFORE THE FIRST VOTE IS CAST BY THE LEGISLATURE.

This year, 120 members of The Florida House of Representatives and 23 members of The Florida Senate will be running for election. PLEASE CONSIDER THE VOTING RECORDS OF THE CANDIDATES BEFORE BECOMING INVOLVED IN THE ELECTIVE PROCESS -- THEN, "BECOME INVOLVED" BY SUPPORTING THE CANDIDATES WHO BEST REPRESENT YOUR INTERESTS.

EY TO SENATE VOTES

On June 9, 1977, in the first special session, the Senate was to take up <u>SB 20 A, SB 21 A, SB 22 A</u>, and <u>SB 23 A</u> which were the economic development tax incentive bills, including the inventory tax reduction, the exemption for pollution abatement #1 equipment for sales tax, the sales tax reduction from 4% to 3% on fuel and energy used in manufacturing, and the sales tax exemption for equipment used in the manufacturing process. Senator MacKay moved that the consideration of SB 20 A, SB 21 A, SB 22 A, and SB 23 A be deferred. The motion was adopted by a vote of 17-14. Associated Industries of Florida opposed the motion because time was running out and any delay decreased the chances for passage of the economic development package. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

#2 5B 511 proposed to exempt from the sales tax the purchase of fuel and energy used in manufacturing or processing goods for sale. This bill was part of an economic development package which Associated Industries of Florida endorsed. On June 2, 1977, the Senate passed SB 511 by a vote of 249. The bill died in the Finance and Taxation Committee of the House of

Representatives. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

#3 SB 22 A in the first session reduced the sales tax on manufacturing fuel and energy from 4% to 3%. It passed the Senate but

died in the House. The Senate voted on June 16, 1977, was 25-12. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

#4 SB 512 proposed to exempt from the sales tax the purchase of pollution control equipment certified as such by the Department of Environmental Regulation. On June 2, 1977, the bill passed the Senate by a vote of 23-9 but died in the House #5

Committee on Finance and Taxation. The Senate vote was 23-10. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

The vote was taken on June 1, 1977, in the Senate. SB 513 would have reduced the sales tax from 4% to 2% on machinery used in furnishing research, communications, transportation or public utility services. Associated Industries of Florida supported SB 513 as part of an economic development incentive package. On June 1, the Senate passed the bill 21-17. SB 513 died in the Finance and Taxation Committee of the House of Representatives. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF

SB 23 A in the first special session capped the amount of sales tax paid on industrial machinery. On June 16, 1977, it passed the Senate by a vote of 24-11 but died in messages to the House. The Senate vote was 24-12. A yea vote is a vote for the #6

position of AIF

#7 SB 662 by Senator Scarborough provided that on public works projects the determination of the required prevailing wage shall include the prevailing basic hourly rate of pay plus the anticipated cost of health and welfare benefits and pension benefits generally provided by contractors or subcontractors. This additional requirement would have driven the cost of public construction upward at a time when the construction industry, laborers and Florida taxpayers could least afford it. AIF opposed the bill. On May 17, 1977, the Senate Governmental Operations Committee reported the bill unfavorably by an 8-2 vote. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

58 949 by Senator Holloway would remove the exemption from the public works law provision which requires the payment of prevailing wage on public works construction contracts. AIF opposed the bill which was ludicrous in a time of low economic activity, decreased construction, increased unemployment and general budget balancing problems in state government. On May 10, 1977, the Senate Governmental Operations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 5-4. The bill went from the Governmental Operations Committee to the Calendar and was withdrawn from the Calendar and referred to the

Appropriations Committee where it died. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

#9 SB 373 by Senator Glisson. On April 21, 1977, the Senate Commerce Committee considered SB 373 which would have changed the selection of physician from the employer to the injured employee. The AIF position is that inasmuch as the employer is held accountable and responsible for the medical treatment of the injured employee, he should have the right to select a competent physician for his injured employees. The Commerce Committee in the Senate agreed and reported the bill unfavorable unanimously. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

SB 1365 increased the severance tax on oil to 8% and changed the distribution of revenues collected from the oil and gas #10 severance tax. Associated Industries of Florida opposed SB 1365. SB 1365 died in the Finance and Taxation Committee of the House of Representatives during the regular session. The roll call vote was 22 year, 13 nays. A nay vote is a vote for the

position of AIF.

#11 On June 16, 1977, in the first special session, the Senate revived <u>SB 1365</u> in the form of <u>SB 39 A</u>. The bill passed by a vote of 23-12 and died in messages to the House of Representatives. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

#12 In the second special session SB 7 B represented the proposed increase in tax on the severance of oil and gas. The vote in the

Senate on June 23, 1977, was 22 yeas, 12 nays. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

SB 32 A. Increase in Severance Tax of Solid Minerals. On June 16, 1977, it passed the Senate by a vote of 27-11. SB 32 A #13 went further than the House bill (HB I A) which only increased the severance tax on phosphate. AIF opposed both bills as

unnecessary and discriminatory. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

On May 24, 1978, the Senate on motion by Senator McClain, read <u>CS/SB 636</u> a third time by title, passed by a 37-2 vote and #14 certified to the House. CS/SB 636 represented the first major piece of legislation to pass either house during the 1978 Regular Session. This bill incorporated many of AIF's proposals and AIF pushed for passage of CS/SB 636. President Brantley played a major role in the passage of this bill. The passage of CS/SB 636 set the groundwork for workmen's compensation all the way through Special Session. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

HB 2075 passed the House of Representatives on May 15, 1978, and was forwarded to the Senate. It was referred to Senator Barron's Governmental Operations Committee where it was voted unfavorable on a vote of 7 nays to 5 yeas on May 22, 1978.

A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

The House of Representatives, on May 31, 1978, amended <u>SB 1240</u> to adopt the name change of the Department of Commerce to the Department of Labor and Employment Security. The bill was then forwarded to the Senate on the same day the amendments were adopted. <u>SB 1240</u> was voted on for final passage. The vote was 24-13. A nay vote is a vote for the #16 position of AIF.

#17 CS/SB 636 dealing with workmen's compensation came out of the House Commerce Committee renumbered HB 2198. After a conference committee between the House and the Senate, the Senate voted on June 2, 1978, to adopt the Conference Report. (The House rejected the Conference Report the same day by a 66-48 vote which killed workmen's compensation for the Regular Session.) The Senate adopted the Conference Committee Report by a 31-9 vote. AIF supported the Conference Committee Report. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.

On June 8, 1978, during the Special Session the Senate voted 39-0 for final passage of SB 3 D. This vote insured the passage

of workmen's compensation legislation. AIF supported this bill. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF,

KEY TO HOUSE VOTES

- #1 HB 2123 provides that when a recipient of unemployment compensation is also receiving benefits from a retirement, pension, or annuity program of a base period employer, regardless of the source of the contributions, such benefits shall serve to deny or reduce the amount of the benefits any unemployment compensation benefits claimed by an involuntarily retired worker. This provision would save employers money. However, also included in the bill was a repealer of the present provision of the law which offsets by the amount of social security benefits received the unemployment compensation benefit paid when the recipient of unemployment compensation is also receiving social security payments. When the bill on May 9, 1977, came before the House of Representatives, Representative Tom Gallagher offered an amendment which would have stricken the social security offset repealer and made the bill very acceptable to employers and protect the depleted Unemployment Compensation Fund. However, the amendment filed to pass. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.
- #2 HB 2123 was passed by both the House of Representatives and the Senate and ultimately signed by the Governor on June 29, 1977. However, prior to the end of the session, an opportunity to amend the law to preserve the social security offset presented itself in the form of CS/SB 1262 by Senator MacKay. CS/SB 1262 was a comprehensive bill to correct some of the abuses to the unemployment compensation program in Florida. On Friday, June 3, CS/SB 1262 was before the House of Representatives for final passage. Representative Forbes offered an amendment which would have conformed CS/SB 1262 to HB 2123 with respect to the repealer of the social security offset provision of the law. His amendment failed to pass by vote of 50-56. Therefore, the final version of CS/SB 1262 dictated that the social security offset provision be left intact. Normally, the second of two bills which affect the same section of law will be the one implemented. However, the Department of Commerce is in the process of trying to implement HB 2123 as a matter of personal philosophical preference by the administrators of the Department. The negative roll call on the amendment to CS/SB 1262 which would have eliminated the social security offset was 50-56.
- #3 SB 654 reduced the assessment on all items of inventory from 25% to 10% of just valuation. This is a bill that Governor Askew asked for as an incentive to economic development, and AIF endorsed as a segment of its economic development proposals. The vote on passage was 29-3. SB 654 died in the House Committee on Finance and Taxation. However, SB 1 B reduced the inventory tax from 25% to 10% of just valuation and passed the Legislature during the second special session in 1977. The House vote on final passage was 92-17. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.
- The 1977 session of the Florida Legislature passed the "Human Rights Act of 1977" (Chapter 77-341, F.S.) which, inter alia, provided that no one under any condition could be forced to retire from his/her employment at any age effective July 1, 1978. Alf supported SB 688 during the 1978 session which provided that companies with "bona fide employee benefit plans" can involuntarily retire employees in accordance with the federal law, i.e. 70 years of age. On May 8, 1978, the House passed this bill by a 96-20 vote.
- #5 On May 17, 1978, the House voted on final passage of HB 963 entitled environmental permitting of commercial development "one stop permitting." The bill, however, died in the Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation. A year vote is a vote for the position of AIF.
- #6 Final passage of <u>SB I D</u>, economic tax package. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF. (June 8, 1978)
- #7 HB 901 would have modified the voting power of the State Apprenticeship Council to insure equal voting power between "joint" and "non-joint" members. This vote is on passage of HB 901 by the House Commerce Committee. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF. (June 1, 1978)
- #8 This vote is on a motion by the Conference Committee appointed by each house to consider workmen's compensation which would have, if it had passed, split the payment of attorney's fees 50/50 between the claimant and the employer/carrier. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF. (June 1, 1978)
- #9 This vote is on motion by Representative Moffitt to reject the Conference Committee Report on Workmen's compensation (HB 2198). This vote had the effect of killing any passage of workmen's compensation legislation for the 1978 Regular Session. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF. (June 2, 1978)
- #10 This vote is on a motion to substitute the House version of workmen's compensation and reject the Senate version which was identical to the Conference Committee Report, HB 2198 which died during Regular Session and was revived by the Senate as SB 3 D. Had the Senate not reconsidered its position, this vote would have killed any passage of workmen's compensation legislation for 1978. A nay vote was a vote for the position of AIF. (June 8, 1978)
- #11 This vote is on second reading on <u>CS/HB 252</u> which would have the effect of sending to third reading <u>CS/HB 252</u> which would change the name of the Department of Commerce to the Department of Labor. A nay vote is a vote for the position of AIF. (April 17, 1978)
- #12 The question recurred on the motion to refer CS/HB 252 to the Committee on Governmental Operations which was agreed to by two-thirds vote. This vote had the effect of stopping the vote for final passage of CS/HB 252.
- #13 CS/HB 252 died in the Governmental Operations Committee. However, it was revived under HB 2075 which amended the bill to change the name of the Department of Commerce to the Department of Labor and Employment Security. A nay vote was a vote in favor of AlF's position. (May 15, 1978)
- #14 The House, subsequently, on May 31, 1978, found as a vehicle <u>SB 1240</u> to change the name of the Department of Commerce to the Department of Labor and Employment Security. The bill was passed by a 71-41 vote. The Senate concurred in amendment and the bill was sent to the Governor for signature. A nay vote was a vote for the position of AIF.
- #15 This is a vote for final passage of HB 1190, reference products liability insurance. A yea vote is a vote for the position of AIF.
