

VOTING RECORDS ARE THE KEY

The voting records contained in this booklet are of the utmost importance to your business. These records reflect how each member of the 1994 Florida Legislature voted on key issues affecting industry thus far this year.

While these are not all of the issues debated in the Legislature, they are those that had the greatest impact on the business community — either in a fiscal or a regulatory manner. Each issue required a legislator's deliberate vote, either for or against a positive economic climate.

During a campaign it matters very little what a candidate professes he or she will do regarding a particular issue if his or her voting record cannot support that stand. Your company, its employees and its stockholders have a stake in the legislative process. We hope this information will give you the insight needed to draw your own conclusions as to whether your legislators' voting patterns have been in the best interest of your business. We urge you to become involved in the electoral process by supporting those candidates who have supported you — and industry as a whole.

The AIF voting records are complete. In addition to votes on final passage for each business bill, we have also included committee and amendment votes. In many cases these votes are more crucial than votes on final passage. An amendment can completely alter the character of a bill. A committee vote can stall a bill or send it speeding toward final passage. AIF only tallies those votes on which we had a public position. These positions will be defined in the accompanying vote keys.

All votes taken in each chamber are tallied in the respective sections of this booklet. For example, a vote taken in the Senate on a House bill is included in the Senate section.

The votes contained in the booklet are the actual votes cast, as reported in official state records. We do not include changed or paired votes. Please remember that these votes have not been corrected by the Legislature at this time. It is still possible for official corrections to be made. These will be available in the bound Senate and House Journals in October of this year; changes will not be made to this publication. AIF records positions of members of the Legislature at the time the vote is recorded.

How to Read Voting Records

The *Voting Records* are divided by House and Senate and then divided in each chamber by topic (i.e. Employment, Environment, etc.). The section on each topic begins with a key that summarizes the content and action on each selected bill. The bills are assigned issue numbers and are numbered consecutively (1, 2, 3, etc.). Each vote on an issue (bill) is identified by a lower case letter in alphabetical order. See the following example.

Post Secondary

AIF took no position on this bill. However, in the final days of the regular session the Senate adopted an amendment to HB 107 that would change the manner in which FPIRG raised money on state college campuses in Florida. The amendment, offered by Sen. Robert Harden (R-Fort Walton), would have restricted any group, association, organization or corporate entity from solicitation of funds in the state university system conditioned upon a negative check-off system. AIF supports such an amendment.

- Record 1a: On April 6, 1994, the Senate adopted Amendment 4 by a vote of 17 yeas to 16 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On April 6, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 26 yeas to 7 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- HB 107 died in Senate Messages.

Following the keys in each section will be a chart that shows the voting tallies for each action on each selected issue. The first row will identify the issue and issue number (1–a, 1–b, etc.). The columns record how each senator or representative voted on the action. The letter "F" signifies that the legislator voted for the AIF position; an "A" indicates that the legislator voted against the AIF position. The last column gives the percentage of pro-business votes recorded by each legislator on that topic during the 1994 Regular and Special Sessions.

The first part of *Voting Records* carries the entire report of the Senate, beginning with the overall ranking for each senator on all the issues selected by AIF, followed by the section reports. The second half gives the entire report on the House of Representatives.

HB 107
Post Secondary
Education:

AIF took no position on this bill. However, in the final days of the regular session the Senate adopted an amendment to HB 107 that would have changed the manner in which FPIRG raised money on state college campuses in Florida. The amendment, offered by Sen. Robert Harden (R-Fort Walton), would have restricted any group, association, organization or corporate entity from solicitation of funds in the state university system conditioned upon a negative check-off system. AIF supports such an amendment.

- Record 1a: On April 6, 1994, the Senate adopted Amendment 4 by a vote of 17 yeas to 16 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On April 6, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 26 yeas to 7 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 107 died in Senate Messages.

HB 237
Administrative
Procedures
by Rep. Sam Mitchell
(D-Chipley)

Each of Florida's branches of government has a defined role in law and policymaking. The Legislature sets policy and writes law. The executive branch implements law and policy. The executive branch, through state agencies, implements law by promulgating rules, which have the effect of law. The rulemaking process is governed by the Administrative Procedures Act. The APA is designed to insure that agency rules effect legislative intent, and it grants citizens due process rights.

In recent years state agencies have become activists. They promulgate rules that exceed the Legislature's policy goals and intent. The private sector is forced to challenge these rules, which is an expensive procedure. The Legislature, led by Representatives Ken Pruitt (R-Port St. Lucie), Sam Mitchell (D-Chipley) and Sen. Charles Williams (D-Live Oak), was determined to strengthen the APA to rein in agencies and force them to follow legislative intent. This would save the private sector the expense and time spent in a rule challenge. AIF supports this effort.

HB 237 revises the legal standards for rulemaking so the courts will force state agencies to promulgate rules that actually reflect legislative intent. This bill balances the need for rulemaking with the need to reflect intent. It will not add procedures that make rulemaking more difficult. AIF supports this bill.

On March 10, 1994, the House Select Committee on Agency Rules passed the bill by a vote of 14 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 4, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 114 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 2a: On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the bill as amended by a vote of 40 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the House concurred in the Senate amendment as amended and passed the bill as further amended by a vote of 115 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 2b: On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call, concurred in the House amendment as amended and passed the bill as further amended by a vote of 40 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

The House considered the bill outside the extended call, concurred in one Senate amendment, refused to concur in other Senate amendments and passed the amended bill by a vote of 114 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 237 died in House Messages; refer to SB 1440.

SB 258 Clarifying Water Policy Definition by Senate Natural Resources and Conservation Committee

Due to the overriding significance of the statewide water policy, AIF supports legislative ratification of ERC amendments to that policy. This bill calls for legislative ratification. A vote for the ratification amendment to the state water policy is a vote for AIF.

- Record 3a: On February 22, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 14 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3b: On March 15, 1994, the Senate Agriculture Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 8 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 258 died in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

SB 378
DEP/Hazardous Waste by
Sen. George Kirkpatrick
(D-Gainesville)

AIF supports the concept of delegation of the Federal Hazardous Waste Program to the Department of Environmental Protection. During the legislative process this bill was amended to provide a graduated fee schedule, a phase-in of DEP positions, funding and language relating to previous EPA agreements.

- Record 4a: On March 17, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 10 years to 0 nays. A "vea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 4b: On April 5, 1994, the Senate Finance & Taxation Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 8 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 378 died on the Senate Calendar.

SB 622 Department of Environmental Protection/ Environmental Permitting by Senate Natural Resources and Conservation Committee AIF supports this legislation to implement the DEP streamlining of permits through the Environmental Resources permit process with no expansion of jurisdiction.

Record 5a: On February 22, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 13 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 622 died on the Senate Calendar.

SB 624
Pollution Prevention/
Toxic Emissions
by Sen. Rick Dantzler
(D-Winter Haven)

AIF supports a voluntary pollution prevention program housed within the Department of Environmental Protection with specific goals negotiated with the Department by each facility. AIF supports incentives for exceeding regulatory levels, including: permit flexibility, permit and fee renewal, extended permit terms and reductions in monitoring and reporting requirements.

Due to Sen. Dantzler's strong control over the bill with no unfavorable or surprise amendments, AIF was able to support this bill throughout the process.

- Record 6a: On February 22, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 10 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 6b: On March 14, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 13 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 624 died on the Senate Calendar.

SB 680
DEP Organization by
Senate Committee on
Natural Resources and
Conservation

AIF supports legislation providing for the organization of the DEP, including the organizational structure of the Ecosystem's Management Deputy. SB 680 restricts the number of assistant secretaries to two, and places restrictions on the Ecosystem Director. In the Senate Natural Resources Committee an amendment was attempted by Sen. Curt Kiser (R-Dunedin) to create a Department of Fish and Wildlife, remove the Marine Fisheries Commission and Marine Patrol from the DEP and place them under the purview of the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. AIF opposed this amendment. A substitute amendment to the amendment was filed by Sen. Buddy Dyer (D-Orlando) to require a study of the issue. AIF supported the Dyer substitute amendment. A vote for the Dyer substitute amendment to Amendment 1 was a vote for AIF. The Study Commission Amendment was later removed in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

- Record 7a: On March 17, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the Dyer Substitute Amendment to Amendment 1 by a vote of 6 yeas to 3 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 7b: On March 17, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 11 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 7c: On April 6, 1994, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 19 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 680 was laid on the table; refer to HB 2445.

SB 1024 DEP/Clean Air Act by Sen. Mario Diaz-Balart (R-Miami)

AIF supports changes in the Clean Air Act to ensure compliance with the federal 1993 Clean Air Act Amendments.

■ Record 8a: On February 11, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 12 yeas to 0 nays. A "vea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1024 was laid on the table; refer to HB 2463.

SB 1346
Delineation Of Wetlands
by Senate Natural
Resources and
Conservation Committee

AIF supports ratification of the Wetlands Delineation Rule with modifications and with no expansion of current jurisdiction. SB 1346 ratified and amended the ERC rule with a more restrictive methodology for the delineation of wetlands and requires the legislature's ratification of amendments to the state water policy. Amendments placed on the Wetlands bill in the Senate Agriculture Committee by Sen. Charles Williams (D-Live Oak) were

supported by AIF. AIF opposed the Gutman amendment in the Senate Agriculture Committee, which removed the requirement for statewide uniformity by striking a restriction on delegation to local programs. AIF supported amending water policy onto the Wetlands bill in the Senate Agriculture Committee.

- Record 9a: On March 2, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 9 yeas to 2 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 9b: On March 23, 1994, the Senate Agriculture Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 9 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 9c: On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the committee substitute by a vote of 38 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994 the House considered SB 1346 outside the extended call and passed the amended bill by a vote of 104 yeas to 12 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 9d: On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered SB 1346 outside the extended call, concurred in the House amendments and passed the amended bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1346 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 1369

Environmental Equity/ Justice Commission by Rep. Josephus Eggelletion (D-Lauderdale Lakes) AIF supports the creation of a balanced Environmental Equity and Justice Commission to examine the possible disproportionate and cumulative concentration of environmental hazards in communities of people of color and low income. AIF worked closely with Rep. Eggelletion to develop a reasonable and balanced approach to this sensitive issue. AIF supported amendments to prohibit the commission from conducting on-site inspections or subpoenaing records of businesses. AIF also supported amendments clarifying that the commission's findings do not create any right to administrative or judicial review.

On March 2, 1994, the Environmental Protection Subcommittee of the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 9, 1994, the House Natural Resources Committee passed the bill by a vote of 15 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 28 yeas to 7 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 5, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 118 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 10a: On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 39 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the House concurred in the Senate amendments and passed the amended bill by a vote of 110 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1369 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

SB 1440 Administrative Procedures by Sen. Charles Williams (D-Live Oak)

Each of Florida's branches of government has a defined role in law and policymaking. The Legislature sets policy and writes law. The executive branch implements law and policy. The executive branch, through state agencies, implements law by promulgating rules, which have the effect of law. The rulemaking process is governed by the Administrative Procedures Act. The APA is designed to insure that agency rules effect legislative intent and to grant citizens due process rights.

In recent years, state agencies have become activists. They promulgate rules that exceed the Legislature's policy goals and intent. It is incumbent on the private sector to challenge these rules, which is an expensive procedure. The Legislature, led by Representatives Ken Pruitt (R-Port St. Lucie), Sam Mitchell (D-Chipley) and Sen. Charles Williams (D-Live Oak), was determined to strengthen the APA to rein in agencies and force them to follow legislative intent. This would save the private sector the expense and time spent in a rule challenge. AIF supports this effort.

SB 1440 revises the legal standards for rulemaking. Hopefully, the courts will force state agencies to promulgate rules that actually reflect legislative intent. AIF does not support every aspect of this bill. In order to move the process along, AIF supports SB 1440, but would prefer adoption of HB 237.

- Record 11a: On March 14, 1994, the Senate Rules and Calendar Committee passed the bill by a vote of 15 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 11b: On April 6, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 37 yeas to 2 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1440 died in Senate Messages.

SB 1442 Environmental Equity/ Justice Commission by Sen. William H. Turner (D-Miami Shores)

AIF supports the creation of a balanced Environmental Equity and Justice Commission to examine possible disproportionate and cumulative concentration of environmental hazards in communities of people of color and low income. AIF supported amendments to prohibit the commission from conducting on-site inspections or subpoenaing records of businesses. AIF also supported amendments clarifying that the commission's findings do not create any right to administrative or judicial review.

■ Record 12a: On March 23, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 10 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1442 was laid on the table; refer to HB 1369.

HB 2445 DEP Organization by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports HB 2445 providing for the organizational structure of the newly created agency. The House bill grants flexibility to the DEP Secretary in the organizational structure. Consolidation of permitting and the DEP Technical Revisers bill were both amended onto HB 2445. AIF supports permit consolidation and the revisers bill.

On March 10, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 34 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 7, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 110 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 13a: On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 38 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the House concurred in the Senate amendments and passed the bill by a vote of 118 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2445 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 2463 Clean Air Act by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports changes in the Clean Air Act to ensure compliance with the federal 1993 Clean Air Act Amendments. This bill became the vehicle for SB 378 and HB 2619 relating to Hazardous Wastes. AIF supports this bill and the amendments.

On April 5, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 113 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 14a: On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered HB 2463 outside the extended call and passed the bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2463 was ordered enrolled.

HEALTH CARE

SB 3060 Florida Health Security Act by Sen. Howard Forman (D-Hollywood) One of Gov. Lawton Chiles' highest priorities in office is health care reform. Gov. Chiles, with the business community's support, developed Florida's managed competition health care system which provides the framework for health care cost containment. However, true cost control cannot be achieved without bringing health insurance to uninsured Floridians.

In 1994, Gov. Chiles proposed Florida Health Security to bring low-cost, private, health insurance to low-income Floridians. Florida Health Security leverages public money with private money to subsidize health insurance premiums. The program is private sector driven. It is voluntary, contains no mandates, provides a stripped-down plan of benefit, and uses private health insurance. It is available to individuals as well as small employers. AIF supports Florida Health Security.

- Record 1a: On March 30, 1994, the Senate Health Care Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On April 6, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 15 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1c: On April 14, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 24 yeas to 16 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position. Even though the bill is full of special interest provisions, AIF supported this bill because it was a necessary vehicle.

On April 15, 1994, the House amended the bill but defeated a motion to roll the bill over to the third reading by a vote of 72 yeas to 41 nays (please note a 2/3 vote is required to roll a bill over to third reading in the same day). AIF opposed the amended bill because it contained numerous special-interest provisions. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 3060 died on the House Calendar.

SB 284
Unemployment

This bill provides for the disqualification from unemployment compensation benefits where an offer of employment is rescinded due to a positive, confirmed drug test conducted pursuant to the Drug-Free Workplace Program. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 1a: On March 8, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill by a vote of 11 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On April, 5, 1994, the Senate amended and passed the bill by a vote of 39 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 284 died in House Messages.

SB 426 State Contractor Health Care Mandate by Sen. William Turner (D-Miami Shores) In a last-minute amendment to the 1992 Health Care Reform Package, the Legislature passed an employer health insurance mandate set to take effect in July 1994. The employer mandate was written and supported by the unions.

The mandate requires that any firm winning a state contract in excess of \$100,000 must pay for health insurance for all employees working on the contract. The law requires that wages could be paid in lieu of insurance. The primary contractor would also be responsible for the subcontractor's employees. AIF opposes any employer health insurance mandate.

An amendment to SB 426 modified the mandate. It requires that the primary contractor, in contracts exceeding \$250,000, provide access to a health insurance plan. The employer is not required to pay any portion of the premium. AIF would prefer to see a total repeal of this mandate. However, Gov. Chiles opposed repeal. AIF supports this modification and will continue to seek repeal. This language was inserted in several bills.

On March 9, 1994, the Senate Governmental Operations Committee passed an amendment which would modify the mandate. The amendment passed by a voice vote.

■ Record 2a: On March 9, 1994, the Senate Governmental Operations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 426 was laid on the table.

On February 23, 1994, the House Employee and Management Relations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 12 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 30, 1994, the House passed the bill by a vote of 110 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 4a: On April 7, 1994, the Senate passed the committee substitute by a vote of 36 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

CS/HB 673 and 1405 was ordered enrolled.

SB 1326 State Contractor Health Insurance Mandate by Sen. John McKay (R-Bradenton)

In a last-minute amendment to the 1992 Health Care Reform Package, the Legislature passed an employer health insurance mandate set to take effect in July 1994. The employer mandate was written and supported by the unions.

The mandate requires that any firm winning a state contract in excess of \$100,000 must pay for health insurance for all employees working on the contract. The law requires that wages could be paid in lieu of insurance. The primary contractor would also be responsible for the subcontractor's employees. AIF opposes any employer health insurance mandate.

An amendment to SB 1326 modified the mandate. It requires that the primary contractor, in contracts exceeding \$250,000, provide access to a health insurance plan. SB 1326 died in House Messages.

SB 1512 State Contractor Health Insurance Mandate by Sen. Robert Wexler (D-Boca Raton)

In a last-minute amendment to the 1992 Health Care Reform Package, the Legislature passed an employer health insurance mandate set to take effect in July of 1994. The employer mandate was written and supported by the unions.

The mandate requires that any firm winning a state contract in excess of \$100,000 must pay for health insurance for all employees working on the contract. The law requires that wages could be paid in lieu of insurance. The primary contractor would also be responsible for the subcontractor's employees. AIF opposes any employer health insurance mandate.

SB 1512 modifies the mandate. It requires that the primary contractor only, in contracts exceeding \$250,000, provide access to a health insurance plan. The employer is not required to pay any portion of the premium. AIF would prefer to see a total repeal of this mandate. However, Gov. Chiles opposes repeal. AIF supports this modification and will continue to seek repeal.

Record 6a: On March 10, 1994, the Senate Health Care Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 6 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1512 died in the Senate Commerce Committee.

SB 1596
Employment
Discrimination
by Sen. Patricia Grogan
(D-Cocoa)

In 1991 AIF helped craft the Florida Civil Rights Act that protects employees against unlawful discrimination, including sexual harassment and pregnancy discrimination. When writing this law, the Legislature balanced the needs of small employers with the necessity for individual protection. The Legislature determined that a small employer's ability to continue operations was equally important to protecting the employee's rights. Thus, the Legislature decided not to impose a legal cause of action (under the civil rights law) against the very smallest employers in Florida, thereby preserving their ability to

continue operations. The civil rights law does not apply to employers with 20 or fewer employees.

In 1992, Sen. Patricia Grogan (D-Cocoa) filed SB 1596. It would extend discrimination protection, as it relates to pregnancy and sexual harassment, to all Florida businesses. The effect of the bill is to provide a legal cause of action relating to any discrimination based upon pregnancy or sexual harassment against any Florida employer regardless of size.

AIF opposes this bill because it places a heavy burden on very small employers.

■ Record 7a: On March 2, 1994, the Senate Judiciary Committee defeated the bill by a vote of 3 yeas to 4 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1596 was laid on the table.

SB 1822 Unemployment Compensation by Sen. John Grant (R-Tampa)

This bill enacts federally mandated provisions relating to the profiling of unemployment applicants. It requires certain applicants to participate in reemployment services in order to be eligible for unemployment benefits. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 8a: On February 28, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill by a vote of 12 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 8b: On March 24, 1994, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 23 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1822 was removed from the Senate Calendar and indefinitely postponed; refer to HB 2447.

AIF supports this bill.

- Record 9a: On February 28, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill by a vote of 12 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 9b: On March 24, 1994, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 18 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

CS/SB 1826 was laid on the table; refer to HB 2447.

The bill provides for continued authorization for the Division of Unemployment Compensation to process unemployment claims by mail. AIF supports this bill.

SB 1828 was indefinitely postponed; refer to HB 2447.

AIF supports this bill.

On March 30, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 112 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 11a: On April 7, 1994, the Senate passed the bill by a vote of 37 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2447 was ordered enrolled.

LEGAL AND JUDICIAL

CS/HB 51
Uniform Foreign Money
Judgment Act
by Rep. Tom Warner
(R-Stuart)

This bill creates a uniform procedure in Florida for the enforcement of certain judgments rendered by foreign courts. The bill was amended on the Senate floor to include a reduced interest rate used to calculate the interest payable on judgments, decrees or settlements rendered in Florida. AIF supports the amendment. A vote for the bill, as amended, to include the interest rate amendment is a vote for the AIF position.

On November 4, 1993, the House Court Systems, Probate & Consumer Law Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On February 16, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 19 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 31, 1994, the House passed the bill by a vote of 117 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 1a: On April 5, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 39 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 7, 1994, the House passed the bill as amended by a vote of 113 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

CS/HB 51 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

SB 1008 Joint and Several Liability by Sen. Peter Weinstein (D-Tamarac) This bill is written and supported by the Academy of Florida Trial Lawyers. They claim it is an attempt to "fix" the Florida Supreme Court's decision, Fabre v. Marin, 623 So.2d 1182 (Fla. 1993). However, AIF strongly supports the Supreme Court's decision and believes the trial lawyer bill is an attempt to return to a form of joint and several liability, which AIF opposes. AIF opposes SB 1008.

The Fabre decision held that a jury must consider the fault of all parties involved in an accident when deciding how much money damages a defendant in the lawsuit should pay. The decision means that a jury could consider the fault of a missing party to an accident when deciding how much money the defendant should pay. Consider the case of a tourist who drives a rented automobile and causes an accident. The tourist leaves the country. The injured plaintiff sues the rental car company because he cannot find the tourist. Under Fabre the jury can consider how much at fault the driver was when deciding how much money the rental car company should pay for its role in the accident. This is fair for the rental car company because unless the jury can consider the driver's fault, the rental car company pays for that driver's fault.

The trial lawyer bill limits the jury to determining the fault of the defendant only. In the illustration above, the rental car company ends up paying for the fault of the driver because the jury cannot even consider whether the driver caused any of the accident. This is, in effect, a return to joint and several liability because it causes one defendant to pay for the fault of another person who caused the damages, simply because that other person is not a "defendant." AIF strongly opposes this bill.

- Record 2a: On February 17, 1994, the Senate Judiciary Committee passed the bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 1 nay. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 2b: On April 6, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill by a vote of 12 yeas to 3 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the House passed the House companion, HB 1425, and sent it to the Senate. The 1994 Regular Session was extended.

- Record 3a: On April 15, 1994, the Senate defeated a motion to take up CS/HB 1425 outside of the exteded call by a vote of 26 yeas to 12 nays (Please note: a motion to consider a bill during the extended session, which is not part of the resolution extending session, requires a 2/3 vote of the entire membership. Twenty-seven votes are needed to hear the bill.). A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3b: On April 15, 1994, the Senate again defeated a motion to take up CS/HB 1425 by a vote of 24 yeas to 14 nays (2/3 vote required). A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1008 died on the Senate Calendar.

SB 2766 Florida False Claims Act by Sen. Robert Wexler (D-Boca Raton)

This bill is patterned after a federal law enacted under the War Powers Act in the 1800s. It is very broad and grants the state wide powers.

The bill creates a civil cause of action against persons and entities who present false claims to the state. It grants civil penalties and treble damages. The problem arises in the definition of "false claim." Under this bill, even a mistake in a corporate tax return can be considered a false claim. The bill is simply too broad. AIF opposes this bill.

■ Record 4a: On March 15, 1994, the Senate Governmental Operations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 6 yeas to 1 nay. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 2766 died in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Joint Resolution: Limit Annual State Revenue by Sen. Robert Wexler (D-Boca Raton) All three of these bills were similar joint resolutions calling for an amendment to the state constitution to provide for limitations in annual spending by the state Legislature. AIF supports all of these bills.

- Record 1a: On January 27, 1994, the Senate Finance & Taxation Committee combined SB 2, SB 4 and SB 416 into a new committee substitute for SB 2. The bill was passed as a committee substitute by a vote of 7 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On March 16, 1994, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 24 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1c: On April 4, 1994, the Senate passed the bill as amended by a vote of 39 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

CS/SB 2 died in the House Appropriations Committee.

HB 2053
House Joint Resolution:
State Revenue Limitation

This bill is a joint resolution calling for an amendment to the state constitution to provide for limitations in annual spending by the state Legislature. This resolution was similar to CS/SB 2. AIF supports this bill.

On February 17, 1994, the House Finance & Taxation Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 29 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 10, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 32 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 116 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 2a: On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call and passed the bill by a vote of 34 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2053 was ordered and enrolled.

HB 2497 Performance-Based Budgets by House Governmental Operations Committee

This bill provides a schedule under which state agencies are required to submit performance-based program budgets. The bill also requires submission of information relating to service areas and programs, performance measures, outputs, outcomes and baseline data to the Executive Office of the Governor for approval. AIF supports this bill.

On March 8, 1994, the House Employee and Management Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 14 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 24, 1994, the House Finance and Taxation Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 17 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 32 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 4, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 116 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 3a: On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call and passed the amended bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the House considered the bill outside the extended call, concurred in the Senate amendments and passed the bill by a vote of 115 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2497 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 2557 Judicial Sales of Real Property by House Finance & Taxation Committee

Originally, this bill was a housekeeping bill for the Department of Revenue and contained minor adjustments to various tax statutes. On the last day of the 1994 Regular Legislative Session, several other tax bills were amended onto HB 2557 and it became the "tax train" for 1994. AIF supports this bill.

On March 17, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 27 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 31, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 114 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 4a: On April 8, 1994, the Senate substituted HB 2557 for CS/SB 1074 and passed the amended bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the House concurred and passed the amended bill by a vote of 115 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2557 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

ENVIRONMENTAL

HB 237 Administrative Procedures by Rep. Sam Mitchell (D-Chipley)

Each of Florida's branches of government has a defined role in law and policymaking. The Legislature sets policy and writes law. The executive branch implements law and policy. The executive branch, through state agencies, implements law by promulgating rules, which have the effect of law. The rulemaking process is governed by the Administrative Procedures Act. The APA is designed to insure that agency rules effect legislative intent, and it grants citizens due process rights.

In recent years, state agencies have become activists. They promulgate rules that exceed the Legislature's policy goals and intent. The private sector is forced to challenge these rules, which is an expensive procedure. The Legislature, led by Representatives Ken Pruitt (R-Port St. Lucie), Sam Mitchell (D-Chipley) and Sen. Charles Williams (D-Live Oak), was determined to strengthen the APA to rein in agencies and force them to follow legislative intent. This would save the private sector the expense and time spent in a rule challenge. AIF supports this effort.

HB 237 revises the legal standards for rulemaking so the courts will force state agencies to promulgate rules that actually reflect legislative intent. This bill balances the need for rulemaking with the need to reflect intent. It will not add procedures that make rulemaking more difficult. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 1a: On March 10, 1994, the House Select Committee on Agency Rules passed the bill by a vote of 14 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On April 4, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 114 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the bill as amended by a vote of 40 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 1c: On April 8, 1994, the House refused to concur in Senate amendments and requested the Senate to recede. The House concurred on one amendment and passed the amended bill by a vote of 115 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the exteded call, passed the amended bill by a vote of 40 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 1d: On April 15, 1994, the House considered the bill outside the extended call, refused to concur and requested the Senate to recede by a vote of 114 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 237 died in Senate Messages; refer to SB 1440.

HB 485 Private Property Rights Act of Florida by Rep. Bert Harris (D-Lake Placid)

AIF supports legislation to strengthen private property rights and compensate landowners for "takings" of private property through government regulation. AIF opposed the Wasserman-Schultz amendment in the House Judiciary Committee to weaken the bill and supported the D. Saunders substitute amendment for a balanced approach to property takings. The D. Saunders substitute amendment passed by a voice vote. A vote for the D. Saunders amendment is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 2a: On March 23, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 21 yeas to 4 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 485 died on the House Calendar.

HB 1111 Pollution Prevention by Rep. Lars Hafner (D-St. Petersburg)

AIF supports a voluntary pollution prevention program housed within the Department of Environmental Protection with specific pollution reduction goals negotiated by each facility with the Department. AIF supports incentives for exceeding regulatory pollution control levels, including: permit flexibility, permit and fee renewal, extended permit terms and reductions in monitoring and reporting requirements. Due to Rep. Lars Hafner's (D-St. Petersburg) ability to build a working coalition and to maintain strong control of the bill with no unfavorable or surprise amendment, AIF was able to support this bill throughout the process.

- Record 3a: On February 23, 1994, the House Environmental Protection Subcommittee of the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 9 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3b: On March 9, 1994, the House Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 22 yeas to 2 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3c: On March 31, 1994, the House Finance and Taxation Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 17 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3d: On April 8, 1994, the House passed the committee substitute by a vote of 102 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1111 died in the Senate Rules and Calendar Committee.

SB 1346 Delineation Of Wetlands by Senate Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports ratification of the Wetlands Delineation rule with modifications and with no expansion of current jurisdiction. SB 1346 ratifies and amends the ERC rule with a more restrictive methodology for the delineation of wetlands and requires the Legislature's ratification of amendments to the state water policy. Amendments placed on the Wetlands bill in the Senate Agriculture Committee by Sen. Charles Williams (D-Live Oak) were supported by AIF. AIF opposed the Gutman amendment in the Senate Agriculture Committee, which removed the requirement for statewide uniformity by striking a restriction on delegation to local programs. AIF supported amending water policy onto the Wetlands bill in the Senate Agriculture Committee.

On March 2, 1994, the Senate Natural Resources Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 9 years to 2 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 23, 1994, the Senate Agriculture Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 9 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the committee substitute by a vote of 38 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 4a: On April 15, 1994, the House considered the bill outside the extended call and passed the amended bill by a vote of 104 yeas to 12 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call, concurred in the House amendments and passed the bill by a vote of 36 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 1346 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 1369 Environmental Equity/ Justice Commission by Rep. Eggelletion (D-Lauderdale Lakes)

AIF supports the creation of a balanced Environmental Equity and Justice Commission to examine the possible disproportionate and cumulative concentration of environmental hazards in communities of people of color and low income. AIF worked closely with Rep. Eggelletion to develop a reasonable and balanced approach to this sensitive issue. AIF supported amendments to require that the commission may not conduct on-site inspections or subpoena records of businesses. AIF also supported amendments stating that the commission's findings do not create any right to administrative or judicial review.

■ Record 5a: On March 2, 1994, the Environmental Protection Subcommittee of the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

- Record 5b: On March 9, 1994, the House Natural Resources Committee passed the bill by a vote of 15 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 5c: On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 28 yeas to 7 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 5d: On April 5, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 118 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 39 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 5e: On April 8, 1994, the House concurred with the Senate amendments and passed the bill by a vote of 110 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1369 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 1397 SLAPP Suits by Rep. Mimi McAndrews (D-West Palm Beach) SLAPP is an acronym for Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation. It is a concept invented by two college professors who believe the courts are being abused by corporations with extra money to spend on silencing opposition. The professors believe corporations entangle opposition in costly lawsuits. The term is now a favorite cry of environmentalists, who, after harassing a permit applicant, find themselves defending a lawsuit.

HB 1397 is an attempt to protect citizens who have harmed others with speech by preventing them from answering for their speech in a courtroom. The bill establishes a very strict legal test that a permit applicant would have to meet in order to bring suit against any person who speaks against the application. The bill provides for attorney fees and damages for a defendant and allows the defendant to stop the lawsuit with a motion to strike.

This bill is an affront to our judicial system. It closes the courts to a particular class of people based simply upon the type of injury the litigant is claiming and the character of the litigant and injury.

In 1992, the Florida Supreme Court ruled that permit applicants had the same protection available to them in court as any other citizen, and that the right of environmentalists to petition government is protected by other means. *Londano v. Turkey Creek*, 609 So.2d 14 (Fla. 1992). In 1993, Attorney General Robert Butterworth studied the SLAPP issue. That study found less than 20 cases (out of thousands filed) that might even be considered SLAPP actions. However, in every case, a valid legal reason can be found for bringing suit.

Courts must be left open to hear the complaints of all citizens, whether corporate or environmental. Many safeguards exist against the abuse of the judicial system. They should remain in place. But people should never be denied their ability to seek redress in court based on the character of their complaints.

Ironically, this bill is designed to absolutely protect the rights of some to speak to government. Yet, when the House committee debated the bill, its sponsor, in a blatant attempt to silence opposition, disallowed any and all public testimony on the bill.

- Record 6a: On March 1, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee, Subcommittee on Court Systems, Probate and Consumer Law heard HB 1397. Without allowing for any public testimony, the committee was forced by Representatives Mimi McAndrews (D-West Palm Beach) and Debbie Wasserman-Schultz (D-Davie) to vote on the bill. The bill was reported favorable by a vote of 5 yeas to 0 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AlF position.
- Record 6b: On March 17, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee defeated the amended bill by a vote of 8 yeas to 12 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1397 was laid on the table.

PCB NR-94-3 DEP Organization by House Natural Resources Committee

This bill creates the organizational structure of the new Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). The bill eliminates an old requirement for two assistant secretaries and reduces the number of agency divisions from 13 to nine.

- Record 7a: On February 9, 1994, the Environmental Protection Subcommittee of the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 11 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 7b: On February 15, 1994, the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 24 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

PCB NR-94-4 became HB 2445.

HB 2445 DEP Organization by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports HB 2445 providing for the organizational structure of the newly created agency. The House bill grants flexibility to the DEP Secretary in the organizational structure. Consolidation of permitting and the DEP Technical Revisers bill were both amended onto HB 2445. AIF supports permit consolidation and the revisers bill.

- Record 7c: On March 10, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 34 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 7c: On April 7, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 110 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 38 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 7e: On April 8, 1994, the House concurred in the Senate amendments and passed bill by a vote of 118 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2445 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

PCB NR-94-2 Federal Clean Air Act/DEP by the House Natural Resources Committee

This bill provides additional powers and duties for the Department of Environmental Protection relating to the Federal Clean Air Act and to training requirements for persons making visible air emissions determination. It provides that certain state operation permits for major sources of air pollution are contingent on federal program approval, and that state annual license fees terminate upon imposition of federal program annual fees. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 8a: On January 5, 1994, the Environmental Protection Subcommittee of the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 9 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 8b: On February 15, 1994, the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 24 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

PCB NR-94-2 became HB 2463.

HB 2463 Clean Air Act by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports changes in the Clean Air Act to ensure compliance with the Federal 1993 Clean Air Act Amendments. This bill became the vehicle for SB 378 and HB 2619 relating to hazardous wastes. AIF supports this bill and the amendments.

Record 8c: On April 5, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 113 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call, concurred in the House amendments and passed the bill by a vote of 36 years to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2463 was ordered enrolled.

PCB NR-94-4 DEP Permit Consolidation by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports this legislation to implement the DEP streamlining of permits through the environmental resources permit process with no expansion of jurisdiction.

- Record 9a: On February 17, 1994, the House Environmental Protection Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 10 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 9b: On February 22, 1993, the House Natural Resources Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 19 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

PCB NR-94-4 became HB 2495.

HB 2495 DEP/Permitting by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports this legislation to implement the DEP streamlining of permits through the environmental resources permit process with no expansion of jurisdiction.

Record 9c: On April 7, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 22 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2495 died on the House Calendar; refer to HB 2445.

HB 2619 DEP/Hazardous Wastes by House Natural Resources Committee

AIF supports the concept of delegation of the Federal Hazardous Waste Program to the Department of Environmental Protection. During the legislative process this bill was amended to provide a graduated fee schedule, a phase-in of DEP positions and funding and language relating to previous EPA agreements. This bill was amended onto HB 2463.

Record 10a: On March 31, 1994, the House Finance and Taxation Committee passed HB 2619 as a committee substitute by a vote of 17 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2619 died in the House Appropriations Committee.

HB 2875 Wetlands/ Uniform Methodology by House Natural Resources Committee

The 1993 legislation that created the DEP and directed permit consolidation and streamlining required a statewide methodology for the delineation of wetlands to be adopted as a rule by the ERC. This methodology is of such statewide significance that it further required ratification of that rule. In 1993, the ERC adopted a very liberal definition and delineation methodology that would place wetlands substantially further "up the hill." HB 2875 ratified the more liberal ERC interpretation with few grandfathering provisions or exemptions. However, AIF supported the House bill as a vehicle with which to work.

Record 11a: On April 6, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 104 yeas to 11 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2875 died in the Senate Natural Resources Committee; refer to SB 1346.

HEALTH CARE

PCB IN 94-01
Health Insurance
by House
Insurance Committee

Since 1990 the Florida Legislature has been reforming the small group health insurance market. AIF supported those reforms.

The reforms are systemic and need time to work in the market.

In 1994, the House Insurance Committee attempted to continue reform. AIF took no position on most of the reform as it was mostly unnecessary at the time. AIF did take a position on two aspects:

EMPLOYER MANDATE – In a last minute amendment to the 1992 Health
Care Reform Package, the Legislature passed an employer health insurance
mandate set to take effect in July 1994. The employer mandate was written
and supported by the unions.

The mandate requires that any firm winning a state contract in excess of \$100,000 pay for health insurance for all employees working on the contract. The law requires that wages can be paid in lieu of insurance. The primary contractor would also be responsible for the subcontractor's employees.

AIF opposes any employer health insurance mandate.

Amendment 1 to PCB IN-94-01 modifies the mandate. It requires that the primary contractor, in contracts exceeding \$250,000, provide access to a health insurance plan. The employer is not required to pay any portion of the premium. AIF would prefer to see a total repeal of this mandate. However, Gov. Chiles opposed repeal. AIF supports this modification and will continue to seek repeal.

In addition, the state contractor amendment contained job protection language so that an employer would be precluded from firing an employee if the employee complains about access to health insurance.

This job protection was very broad. It:

- does not contain any employer defenses;
- does not allow an employer to terminate an employee for any other reason after the employee complains about access to health insurance;
- · leads to jury trials and tort-like damages;
- provides more job protection than civil rights laws.

AIF opposes this type of job protection.

Amendment 1C strikes the job protection. AIF supported the amendment. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On March 14 1994, the amendment was adopted by a voice vote.

GUARANTEE ISSUE FOR INDIVIDUALS – The bill contained a
requirement that all individuals be guaranteed issuance of a health insurance
policy. This means that no individual could be turned down for coverage for
any reason other than failure to pay the premium.

AIF opposes the individual guarantee issue. It leads to adverse selection, which leads to cost increases. Florida Health Security is a better method of bringing insurance to individuals. A substitute amendment to Amendment 55 was filed in the House Insurance Committee to remove the individual guarantee issue. AIF supports the amendment.

- Record 1a: On March 9, 1994, the House Insurance Committee defeated Amendment 1C by a vote of 4 yeas to 13 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position. Due to time constraints the meeting of the House Insurance Committee was continued at a later date. At the next convened meeting the committee adopted an amendment to clarify and limit the job protection. AIF supported that amendment. It was adopted by voice vote.
- Record 1b: On March 14, 1994, the House Insurance Committee defeated a substitute amendment to Amendment 55 by a vote of 5 yeas to 15 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

The proposed committee bill was never filed as a bill.

HB 1
Universal Access to
Health Care
by Rep. Elaine Gordon
(D-North Miami)

HB 1 creates the Florida Universal Access Health Plan. Universal access is a Canadian-style health plan whereby every Florida resident would be entitled free access to health care. "Florida resident" is defined by the courts to mean any person who is in the state of Florida with the intent to stay — no matter how long he or she has been in Florida.

Free health care, available in a state as friendly to live in as ours, would result in adverse selection. An explosion of seriously ill "residents" searching for free health care would move into the state.

The health plan would be financed by most Floridians through a tax similar to an income tax. However, AIF believes the costs would rise so rapidly (due to adverse selection and other factors), that the tax would be raised every year to keep the system out of bankruptcy. AIF opposes universal access at this time because it is not a viable option when done on a state-by-state basis. In addition, the plan would be state-run. AIF opposes a state-run health care system.

- Record 2a: On February 23, 1994, the Subcommittee on Health Care Services of the House Health Care Committee passed the bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 2b: On March 9, 1994, the House Health Care Committee passed the bill by a vote of 11 yeas to 9 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1 died in the House Finance and Taxation Committee.

HB 1427 Any Willing Provider by Rep. Everett Kelly (D-Tavares)

This bill is an "Any Willing Provider" (AWP) health care bill. It requires an Accountable Health Partnership (an insurance company) to permit any health care provider to participate as a service provider under an insurance plan, if the provider accepts the same reimbursement rates provided to other providers offering the same service under the plan.

AIF opposes AWP legislation. The concept of managed care is undermined by allowing all health providers access as participants. The ability of accountable health partnerships to effectively manage the quality and cost of health care providers is restricted. It is estimated that health care costs will rise by 30 percent as a result of this type of unrestricted access.

- Record 3a: On March 7, 1994, the Health Services Subcommittee of the House Health Care Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 10 yeas to 0 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3b: On March 9, 1994, the House Health Care Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 17 yeas to 6 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1427 died in the House Appropriations Committee.

PCB HC-94-100 Florida Health Security Act by House Health Care Committee

One of Gov. Lawton Chiles' highest priorities in office is health care reform. Gov. Chiles, with the business community's support, developed Florida's managed competition health care system, which provides the framework for health care cost containment. However, true cost control cannot be achieved without bringing health insurance to uninsured Floridians.

In 1994 Gov. Chiles proposed Florida Health Security to bring low-cost, private, health insurance to low-income Floridians. Florida Health Security leverages public money with private money to subsidize health insurance premiums. The program is private sector driven. It is voluntary, contains no mandates, provides a stripped-down plan of benefits, and uses private health insurance. It is available to individuals as well as small employers. AIF supports Florida Health Security.

Record 4a: On March 17, 1994, the House Health Care Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 12 years to 8 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

PCB HC-94-100 became HB 2823.

Chiles, with the business community's support, developed Florida's managed competition health care system, which provides the framework for health care cost containment. However, true cost control cannot be achieved without bringing health insurance to uninsured Floridians.

In 1994 Gov. Chiles proposed Florida Health Security to bring low-cost, private, health insurance to low-income Floridians. Florida Health Security leverages public money with private money to subsidize health insurance premiums. The program is private sector driven. It is voluntary, contains no mandates, provides a stripped-down plan of benefit, and uses private health insurance. It is available to individuals as well as small employers. AIF supports Florida Health Security.

Amendment 28 – Delegation. The House Florida Health Security bill contains a very broad delegation of legislative authority. It allows the Agency for Health Care Administration to make "any" necessary changes to Florida Health Security to satisfy the federal government. This grant is entirely too broad. It can lead to large substantive changes in the law without legislative approval. Rep. George Albright (R-Ocala) filed Amendment 28 in the House Appropriations Committee to remove the delegation. AIF supports the amendment.

■ Record 4b: On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee defeated Amendment #28 by a vote of 11 yeas to 21 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Amendment 42 – "Any Willing Provider" was filed in the House Appropriations Committee. The amendment requires an Accountable Health Partnership to permit any health care provider to participate as a service provider under a plan, if the provider accepts the same reimbursement rates provided to other providers offering the same service under the plan. AIF opposes AWP legislation. The concept of managed care is undermined by allowing all health providers access as participants. The ability of accountable health partnerships to effectively manage the quality and cost of health care providers is restricted. It is estimated that health care costs will rise by 30 percent as a result of this type of unrestricted access.

- Record 4c: On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee defeated Amendment 42 by a vote of 16 yeas to 18 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 4d: On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 23 yeas to 13 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 4e: On March 31, 1994, the House defeated Amendment 77 (AWP) by a vote of 52 yeas to 62 nays. AIF opposes "Any Willing Provider" (see record 3a and 3b) A "nay" vote is vote for the AIF position.
- Record 4f: On March 31, 1994, the House passed the bill as amended by a vote of 61 yeas to 46 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2823 died in the Senate Health Care Committee.

SB 3060 Florida Health Security Act by Sen. Howard Forman (D-Hollywood)

One of Gov. Lawton Chiles' highest priorities in office is health care reform. Gov. Chiles, with the business community's support, developed Florida's managed competition health care system, which provides the framework for health care cost containment. However, true cost control cannot be achieved without bringing health insurance to uninsured Floridians.

In 1994, Gov. Chiles proposed Florida Health Security to bring low-cost, private, health insurance to low-income Floridians. Florida Health Security leverages public money with private money to subsidize health insurance premiums. The program is private sector driven. It is voluntary, contains no mandates, provides a stripped-down plan of benefits, and uses private health insurance. It is available to individuals as well as small employers. AIF supports Florida Health Security.

On March 30, 1994, the Senate Health Care Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 6, 1994, the Senate Commerce Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 15 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 14, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 24 yeas to 16 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position. Even though the bill is full of special interest provisions, AIF supported this bill because it was a necessary vehicle.

Record 5a: On April 15, 1994, the House amended the bill but defeated a motion to roll over the bill to third reading by a vote of 72 yeas to 41 nays (please note a 2/3 vote is required to roll a bill over to third reading in the same day). AIF opposed the amended bill because it contained numerous special-interest provisions. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

SB 3060 died on the House Calendar.

These bills provide for the denial of unemployment benefits where unemployment is due to a discharge for drug use or for failing a pre-employment drug test. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 1a: On February 22, 1994, the Subcommittee on Employee Benefits of the House Employee and Management Relations Committee passed the proposed committee substitute with one amendment by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On February 23, 1994, the House Committee on Employee and Management Relations passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 12 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1c:. On March 30, 1994, the House passed the bill by a vote of 110 yeas to 0 nays, A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 7, 1994, the Senate passed the bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

CS/HB 673 and 1405 were ordered enrolled.

HB 1205

(D-West Palm Beach)

This bill lowers the requalification requirements for seasonal farmworkers who have been disqualified from receiving unemployment benefits due to voluntarily quitting a job. AIF opposes this bill.

Record 2a: On March 1, 1994, the amended bill failed in the Employee Benefits Subcommittee of the House Employee & Management Relations Committee by a vote of 3 yeas to 5 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1205 died in the House Employee & Management Relations Committee.

HB 1581 Employment Discrimination by Rep. Mary Brennan (D-Pinellas Park) In 1991, AIF helped craft the Florida Civil Rights Act that protects employees against unlawful discrimination, including sexual harassment and pregnancy discrimination. When writing this law, the Legislature balanced the needs of small employers with the necessity for individual protection. The Legislature determined that a small employer's ability to continue in operation was equally important to protecting the employee's rights. Thus, the Legislature decided not to impose a legal cause of action (under the civil rights law) against the very smallest employers in Florida, thereby preserving their ability

to continue operation. The civil rights law does not apply to employers with 20 or fewer employees.

In 1994 Rep. Mary Brennan (D-Pinellas Park) filed HB 1581. It would extend discrimination protection as it relates to pregnancy and sexual harassment to all Florida employers. The effect of the bill is to provide a legal cause of action relating to any discrimination based upon pregnancy or sexual harassment against any Florida employer, regardless of size.

AIF opposes this bill because it places a heavy burden on very small employers.

Record 3a: On March 1, 1994, the Court Systems, Probate and Consumer Law Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee, passed the amended bill by a vote of 6 yeas to 2 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1581 died in the House Judiciary Committee.

CS/HB 1721 Restraint of Trade by Rep. Bill Sublette (R-Orlando) The bill prohibits the use of noncompetition agreements between employers and employees except when such agreements relate to the protection of a specific trade secret, customer lists or the direct solicitation of customers. AIF supported an amendment that was adopted during the committee process that allows employers to use noncompetition agreements when an employee is provided extraordinary training by the employer; however, AIF opposes the bill because it is too restrictive and current law provides an adequate balance in weighing the competing interests of the employer and employee.

Record 4a: On March 10, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 20 yeas to 0 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

CS/HB 1721 died on the House Calendar.

LEGAL AND JUDICIAL

CS/HB 51
Uniform Foreign
Money Judgment Act
by Rep. Tom Warner
(R-Stuart)

This bill creates a uniform procedure for the enforcement in Florida of certain judgments rendered by foreign courts. The bill was amended on the Senate floor to include a reduced interest rate used to calculate the interest payable on judgments, decrees or settlements rendered in Florida. AIF supports the amendment. A vote for the bill, as amended, to include the interest rate amendment is a vote for the AIF position.

- Record 1a: On November 4, 1993, the House Court Systems, Probate & Consumer Law Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On February 16, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 19 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1c: On March 31, 1994, the House passed the bill by a vote of 117 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 5, 1994, the Senate passed the amended bill by a vote of 39 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

Record 1d: On April 7, 1994, the House passed the bill as amended by a vote of 113 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 51 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 1185 Florida False Claims Act by Rep. John Cosgrove (D-Miami) This bill is patterned after a federal law enacted under the War Powers Act in the 1800s. It is very broad and grants the state wide powers.

The bill creates a civil cause of action against persons and entities who present false claims to the state. It allows civil penalties and treble damages. The problem arises in the definition of "false claim." Under this bill, even a mistake in a corporate tax return can be considered a false claim. The bill is simply too broad. AIF opposes this bill.

■ Record 2a: On March 1, 1994, the Court Systems Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as amended by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 2b: On March 8, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 18 yeas to 0 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1185 died on the House Calendar.

HB 1425 Joint And Several Liability by Rep. Robert Trammell (D-Marianna)

This bill is written and supported by the Academy of Florida Trial Lawyers. They claim it is an attempt to "fix" the Florida Supreme Court's decision, Fabre v. Marin, 623 So.2d 1182 (Fla 1993). However, AIF strongly supports the Supreme Court decision, and believes the trial lawyer bill is an attempt to return to a form of joint and several liability, which AIF opposes. AIF opposes HB 1425.

The Fabre decision held that a jury must consider the fault of all parties involved in an accident when deciding how much money damages a defendant in the lawsuit should pay. Consider the case of a tourist who drives a rented automobile and causes an accident. The tourist leaves the country. The injured plaintiff sues the rental car company because he cannot find the tourist. Under Fabre, the jury can consider how much the driver was at fault when deciding how much money the rental car company should pay for its role in the accident. This is fair for the rental car company. Unless the jury can consider the driver's fault, the rental car company pays for that driver's fault.

The trial lawyer bill limits the jury to determining the fault of the defendant only. This is, in effect, a return to joint and several liability because it causes one defendant to pay for the fault of another person who caused the damages, simply because that other person is not a "defendant." AIF strongly opposes this bill.

The bill was amended in the House Judiciary Committee. AIF opposes the amendment,

Under Fabre law, the jury assigns a percentage of fault to all parties sharing blame. The amendment allows a plaintiff to agree on a percentage of fault to assign to a person the plaintiff settles with. If remaining defendants wanted to challenge the agreed-upon percentage, they could plead to the judge. However, defendants would have an almost insurmountable procedural hurdle to cross in order to change the agreement. The practical effect of the amendment was to allow plaintiffs, rather than juries, to assign percentage of fault. This takes away a defendant's ability to defend himself. AIF opposes the bill and the amendment.

- Record 3a: On March 23, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the strike-everything-after-the-enacting-clause amendment by a vote of 19 yeas to 7 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3b: On March 23, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 16 yeas to 9 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

- Record 3c: On April 7, 1994, the House adopted Substitute Amendment 1 by a vote of 75 yeas to 39 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3d: On April 7, 1994, the House defeated a motion to roll the bill over to third reading by a vote of 58 yeas to 55 nays (please note a 2/3 vote is required to roll a bill over to third reading in the same day). Thus, a final House vote was postponed until the last day of the regular session. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3e: On April 7, 1994, the House passed the bill as amended by a vote of 62 yeas to 47 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate defeated a motion to consider CS/HB 1425 outside the extended call by a vote of 26 yeas to 12 nays (Please note: a motion during an extended session on a bill that is not part of the resolution requires a 2/3 vote of the entire membership.). A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate again defeated a motion to take up CS/HB 1425 by a vote of 24 yeas to 14 nays (2/3 vote required). A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1425 died on the Senate Calendar.

HB 1599 Interest Rates: Judgments Or Decrees by Rep. Ronald Klein (D-Boca Raton) This bill provides that the Comptroller of the State of Florida shall, on October 1 of each year, set the rate of interest payable on judgments or decrees by averaging the federal discount rate for the preceding year, then adding 300 basis points to the averaged federal discount rate. This bill reduces the excessive interest rate payable on judgments under current law. Furthermore, it brings the rates payable on judgments to a level consistent with market interest rates. An amendment to the bill on the House floor removed confusing exceptions added in the House Judiciary Committee. A vote for the bill is a vote for the AIF position.

- Record 4a: On February 14, 1994, the Court Systems Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee passed the proposed committee substitute by a vote of 7 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 4b: On March 10, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the committee substitute by a vote of 17 yeas to 2 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 4c: On April 4, 1994, the amended bill passed the House by a vote of 103 yeas to 10 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1599 died in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

HB 2041
Antitrust Actions:
Treble Damages
by Rep. Ron Klein
(D-Boca Raton)

The bill allows the Florida attorney general to pursue claims and recover damages on behalf of indirect, downstream purchasers asserting antitrust claims. Currently, only direct purchasers can collect damages under antitrust law. AIF opposes this bill. The state is given broad authority that will unnecessarily allow businesses to be targeted by the state. Additionally, the judicial system will be adversely affected by the complexity and cost in determining the validity of downstream purchaser claims. Retailers will unwillingly be embroiled in complex litigation.

■ Record 5a: On March 10, 1994, the House Judiciary Committee passed the committee substitute by a vote of 10 yeas to 9 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2014 died on the House Calendar.

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TAXATION

HB 2053
House Joint Resolution:
State Revenue Limitation
by Rep. John Long
(D-Land O'Lakes)

This bill is a joint resolution calling for an amendment to the state constitution to provide for limitations in annual spending by the state Legislature. This resolution was similar to CS/SB 2. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 1a: On February 17, 1994, the House Finance & Taxation Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 29 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On March 10, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 32 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record Ic: On April 8, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 116 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call and passed the bill by a vote of 34 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2053 was ordered and enrolled.

HB 2497
Performance-Based
Budgets
by House Governmental
Operations Committee

This bill provides a schedule under which state agencies are required to submit performance-based program budgets. The bill also requires submission of information relating to service areas and programs, performance measures, outputs, outcomes and baseline data to the Executive Office of the Governor for approval. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 2a: On March 8, 1994, the House Employee and Management Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 14 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 2b: On March 24, 1994, the House Finance and Taxation Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 17 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 2c: On March 29, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the amended bill by a vote of 32 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 2d: On April 4, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 116 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 15, 1994, the Senate considered the bill outside the extended call and passed the amended bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 1 nay. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 2e: On April 15, 1994, the House considered the bill outside the extended call, concurred in the Senate amendments and passed the bill by a vote of 115 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2497 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

HB 2557

Judicial Sales of

Originally, this bill was a housekeeping bill for the Department of Revenue and contained minor adjustments to various tax statutes. On the last day of the 1994 Regular Legislative Session, several other tax bills were amended onto HB 2557 and it became the "tax train" for 1994. AIF supports this bill.

- Record 3a: On March 17, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 27 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 3b: On March 31, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 114 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

On April 8, 1994, the Senate substituted HB 2557 for CS/SB 1074 and passed the amended bill by a vote of 36 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

■ Record 3c: On April 8, 1994, the House concurred and passed the amended bill by a vote of 115 yeas to 0 nays. A "yea" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 2557 was ordered engrossed and enrolled.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

HB 1167
Retirement/
Communicable Diseases
by Rep. Fred Lippman
(D-Hollywood)

This bill provides that full-time firefighters, paramedics, medical technicians and correctional officers who contract certain diseases carried by blood-borne pathogens, including hepatitis and the HIV virus, are deemed to have a disability suffered on the job. These diseases become compensable in the workers' compensation system, even though the claimant may have contracted the disease outside of work. AIF opposes this bill.

- Record 1a: On March 1, 1994, the House Employee Benefits Subcommittee of the House Employee & Management Relations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 5 yeas to 2 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1b: On March 3, 1994, the House Employee & Management Relations Committee passed the bill as a committee substitute by a vote of 11 yeas to 2 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1c: On March 31, 1994, the House Appropriations Committee passed the bill by a vote of 20 yeas to 8 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.
- Record 1d: On April 7, 1994, the House passed the amended bill by a vote of 67 yeas to 43 nays. A "nay" vote is a vote for the AIF position.

HB 1167 died in the Senate Personnel, Retirement and Collective Bargaining Committee.
